Human Traditions to 1500. This required introductory course explores the development of human civilization using a thematic approach. (Fall 2008, Fall 2009)
Human Traditions from 1500. This required introductory course explores the evolution of human civilization using a thematic approach. (Spring 2009)
Telling Tales of the Past. This introductory course explores the various ways that humans present the past, ranging from academic history to popular film to memorials. (Fall 2009)
World Civilization I: History to 1500. This required introductory course explores how an ever-quickening process of globalization shaped the history of humankind from the first hunter-gatherers to the Age of Exploration. (Fall and Spring 2005-2008)
World Civilization II: History from 1500. This course explores similar themes to those covered in the first half of the sequence but begins with the Reformation and concludes with the current conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. (Fall and Spring 2005-2008)
European History to 1500. This introductory survey examines the evolution of European society from the Greek dark age to the dawn of the Protestant Reformation. (Fall 2008)
European History from 1500. This introductory survey examines the evolution of European society from the Reformation to the end of the Cold War. (Spring 2009)
English History to 1688. This upper-level course combined a survey of English history from earliest times with questions about how history is written and presented. (Fall 2007, Fall 2009)
British and Irish History from 1688. This upper-level course traced the social, cultural, and political evolution of the British Isles by examining interaction between England, Scotland, Wales, and Ireland. (Spring 2006, Spring 2009)
History of Modern Tourism. This upper-level interdisciplinary course used both lectures and readings-based seminar formats to introduce students to the history of modern tourism. Students were required to undertake a significant original research project. (Fall 2004, Fall 2006, and Fall 2008)

Nations and Nationalism in European History. This upper-level seminar was designed to introduce students to various scholarly theories of nationalism covering the Middle Ages to the present. (Spring 2008)

Historiography of Nineteenth-Century Europe. This capstone readings seminar was designed to introduce students to the basics of historiography, as well as to significant topics in nineteenth-century European history. (Spring 2007)

Twentieth-Century Europe. This upper-level seminar covered various topics in the social, economic, political, and cultural history of Europe between 1914 and 1989. (Fall 2005)
